The Childhood Care and Education Community in Washington County Expands Through *The Resource News*

Metro Child Care Resource and Referral (CCR&R) is excited to be adding over 300 Kindergarten teachers to *The Resource News* mailing list. *The Resource News* is a communication and information tool for those who work in the Childhood Care and Education field in Washington County. The "News" is currently being mailed to over 700 family child care providers, 130 child care centers, and 250 Oregon Association of Education for Young Children members in Washington County. We mail many more to partners in the Childhood Care and Education field outside of Washington County to keep them appraised of what's going on here.

What do all of these individuals have in common? CHILDREN! It is estimated that 60% of mothers with preschool age children work outside the home. So many of the children that enter kindergarten in Washington County have also been in some type of child care setting. A child being served in child care today will eventually enter into one of the Washington County school districts. Adding Kindergarten teachers to our mailing list is very exciting! The Resource News can inform these teachers of the types of issues and activities children are a part of before entering school, and the Kindergarten teachers can inform child care providers through The Resource News about the types of issues and activities children take part in when they enter Kindergarten.

What is Temperament?

As caregivers, we continue to learn and experiment with how best to provide a nurturing, educational environment for the children we care for. A child's environment, experiences, and genetics all play a part in shaping the child's personality development. Environment can take into account a variety of factors. For example, a child's birth order, being "the baby of the family," has an affect on the development of the child's personality. Additionally, the socio-economic status of the family in which the child is raised also has an impact upon the personality development of the child. Although environment plays a significant role in personality development, it's important to consider another critical element; genetics and the child's temperament. Environment in association with genetics contribute to a child's overall temperament and personality.

Temperament is a collection of traits that a child is born with. There are traits/characteristics which are actually inherited. Thus the expression, "You're just like your Great Aunt Lucy!" has some validity. For example, if you care for a child who is typically happy and content, there is an 80% probability that the child inherited that trait from a parent. Other qualities rooted in temperament are stubbornness, spontaneity, and fearlessness.

Being able to identify different temperament traits enables caregivers and parents to individualize the type of care they provide. There are ten traits that are examined when assessing a child's temperament profile: Approach/Withdrawal, Adaptability, Intensity, Mood, Emotional Sensitivity, Activity Level, Distractibility, Persistence, Sensory Awareness and Regularity.

Caring for children is a challenge, ask anyone who has done so for even a short period of time. Learning to do a basic temperament profile can assist you in caring for and understanding the children in your care.

- Have you ever cared for a "Tigger", the child that just can't sit still?
- What about the toddler who will not let go of your leg?
- Do you know a school-ager who forgets their homework, backpack or coat on a regular basis?
- How about the infant that can't seem to adjust to a regular schedule?

"View and Reflect" is an opportunity for caregivers to view videos, reflect on the information, and complete an activity sheet that is relevant to the information shared on the video. Once the activity sheet is complete, a certificate of training will be issued. This program is available to all caregivers in Washington County and is accessible through the Washington County Library system. The Washington County Library system has been very responsive to caregivers and has developed theme bags, book boxes, book pulls, big books, and more. They have also invested in quality childhood care and education training videos which can be accessed from any Washington County Library. Just go into your local library and use the patron computer to access Wili-Net (the library computer system). Enter the title of the video that you want to reserve and have it sent to your local library where you can pick it up. Currently there are a limited number of videos in the "View and Reflect" program, however, we will be adding more titles as they become available and will list them in *The Resource News*. 

Keeping Children Healthy in the Winter Time



During the winter season, children, adults and germs will spend more time indoors. Yes, that's right, the germs will be present also. They will appear in the form of colds, flu's, sore throats, headaches, oh the list goes on and on. However, we have some great germ busting solutions for you in this article. When children, and adults get sick, it often disrupts our daily routines and makes everything else seem unimportant. Illnesses can also become very expensive when one calculates lost income, medication, doctor appointments and so on. One of the simplest ways to rid the environment of germs is **HANDWASHING!** If everyone in the environment washes their hands especially during these times, then you will be waging a war against germs that can be fairly successful.

Ш	Arrival! Imagine every child coming into child care with their household germs on their
	hands. If children and staff wash their hands upon arrival, then you start with a clean slate. It's a
	safe way to start the day!
	Wash children's hand after toileting. Don't assume that they will remember.
	Wash before and after eating.
	Caregivers should wash their hands every time they help a child blow their nose.
	Don't forget to have children wash their hands after blowing their own nose.
	Don't forget to disinfect those door knobs and door handles. Start the day off by having them
	sanitized, and do it once again during the day.

Children should understand why it's important to wash their hands. Try reading, Those Mean Nasty Dirty Downright Disgusting but Invisible Germs by Judith Rice. It depicts a little girl named Beth in a child care setting. It explains how she gets germs on her hands and how they can effect her. Try this project: Allow children to make germ shapes similar to the ones in the book out of shaving cream on a piece of wax paper. Carry them to the sink and turn on the faucet and wash them down the drain!
