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



Peruvian. I asked her if I could interview her. She barely spoke any English and my Spanish wasn't enough to really have a conversation — but we could communicate. **The experience totally inspired me to be able to get my ideas across in a foreign language** — even though my conversation skills were so horrible. I would leave the restaurant each time feeling inspired and determined — that's how I decided on my majors.

"As for international studies, I always wanted to travel. It seemed a good way to learn about the

world. I study politics, intercultural communications and some Spanish. I'm now working on my senior thesis. It's about the Mothers of the Plaza de Mayo, a human rights organization formed by the mothers of children who disappeared in Argentina in the late 70's and early 80's. I am getting most of my information through the Internet and going through catalogs at the library. We have access to about 15 different libraries in the area through the computer network.

"I've met a lot of interna-

tional students since I've been here and that's been very eye-opening to get to know them and talk with them about their cultures. Last fall I studied and lived in Ecuador. It was probably one of the biggest challenges of my life – and it was totally worth it.

I lived with a family and we worked during the day doing volunteer internships, mainly in schools in poor areas. At night we went to class. I spoke Spanish the whole time and it increased my fluency immensely. "The Spanish Club sometimes puts on plays in Spanish and they're written by the students. I tutor in the Writing Center. Once a week I tutor beginning Spanish students to help them understand everything that goes on in class.

"After my trip to Ecuador, I decided I really wanted to run in the Portland Marathon. My coach helped me plan for it and train. Over the summer break he left me a schedule of everything I should do – June through August – including his phone number. I placed fourth in my age group and I qualified for nationals. **The coaches here are excellent. They put so much time into it – I totally trust them.** They know the mental blocks you are going to have as well as the physical ones. They know your limitations, but they always try to push you a little bit more.




relations after college. I really feel a pull in the direction of Portland's creative community.



"Dr. Lopez and I are going to do a contract class together on herpetology. We're going to make up our own class. I'll be the only student and she's going to teach me everything


she knows. I'll outline the course - what reading I'm going to do, what my objectives are, how I'll be graded - then I'll meet with Pam once or twice a week.

"At the same time, being here has helped me focus a lot more. I definitely want to go into conservation. But it's also opened up a lot of other possibilities as well. There's so much out there.


#### "Last year, I did this great research project – a baseline ecological study of the Tualatin River.
