

For 'Boxer,' Pacific University Students Look Like Wildcat Tamers

— Phi Beta Tau Fraternity, in alliance with the boys from the Fire Hall, made off with Pacific University's coveted "Boxer" after four hours of mayhem, mauling and madness Wednesday.

The torn and bloody members of the fraternity fought their way to an old 1947 Chevrolet and made their escape after participating in a struggle which one professor described as the worst he's seen in 20 years.

Wednesday's battle for Boxer began shortly after 10 a.m., when the bronze, horned

chimera, weighing 20 pounds, innocently entered the campus in the trunk of a car driven by Mrs. Russell Roberts.

Accompanying Mrs. Roberts in the caper was Mrs. Myrtle Smith, widow of the late D. Otis Smith, once faculty adviser at the school.

Lurking in the trunk and holding Boxer was Gamma Sigma fraternity member Pete Truax who, when the trunk was opened, threw Boxer up for grabs.

Throughout the day screaming cords urged on hulking mountains of humanity from the school fraternities and dorms. Pieces of clothing, shoes and bodies flew in the air as the grunting struggle

for the briefly eloped sculpture wide with fear, ran with fire oscillated on the form the bronze beast for several hours before being brought down.

Allegedly over 100 years old, Boxer was donated to the college in 1896. Since then Boxer has been a symbol of student rivalry and an inspiration to

Tradition calls for the statue to be "flashed," shown by the possessors, or "thrown up," for possession each year.

For the last four years, however, Boxer has been in hiding. Members of Gamma Sigma said they decided to throw up Boxer this year to renew tradition and stimulate school spirit.

Renewing the tradition Wednesday should have made up for the last four years, and for four or five years to come. Eight students were sent to the infirmary, one to the hospital and the rest appeared to have spent the day sorting wildcats.
