This month I traveled to Washington DC to participate in national Community Action activities. It occurred to me that many of our staff may not be aware of the larger "Community Action World". In Oregon we have 16 Community Action agencies serving lowincome families all across the state. We have formed an association of our agencies called The Community Action Partnership of Oregon, formerly known as CADO (Community Action Directors of Oregon). The Executive Directors meet bimonthly, around the state, to address advocacy, training and funding issues that effect our agencies and low-income people. Our state association sponsors an annual conference on poverty in Oregon, which attracts nearly 500 staff from community action agencies and our partners around the state, for two and half days of training, networking and inspiration. This year's conference will be held in Seaside, November 6-8, and will feature Juan Williams as our banquet keynote speaker. Hopefully, we will be well represented at this conference. 
What's Developing?

IT Tips

In the past there have been some issues with nonwork related network and computer resource utilization. While the situation is improving, I would like to explain what the problem is and why it's an issue. At the computer level the problems have been with programs brought from home, downloaded from the Internet, or received in e-mail that doesn't relate to the user's job. While this software seems harmless it can have several negative affects on system performance. First, it is impossible to know how new software might affect other programs in our environment without extensive testing. Second, it can complicate trouble-shooting of systems by Information Systems staff when problems do arise. Third, some of this software consumes system resources needed for other programs even when it is not actively being used. Finally, the software may contain hidden malicious programs designed to compromise our systems security.continued on page 4

HR (Benefits/Diversity/Q&A) Ask Winnie

As many of you already know, Community Action provides regular full time employees a Group Term Life Insurance Policy. The basic benefit amount is \$13,000 (this amount could be greater if your death is caused by an accident). Community Action pays the premium for you. We have recently added a Supplemental Life feature to our policy, which allows you to purchase additional amounts of insurance coverage in increments of \$10,000. You would pay for this additional coverage through a payroll deduction and the premium is "age rated". This means the younger you are the less expensive the premium is — for instance a person under age 30 would pay \$1.00 per month for the additional \$10,000 or \$2.00 per month for an additional \$20,000. If you want more information on your specific situation, please contact me in HR & I'll send you the brochure & application. Because this is a change to our policy, we are issuing new policies to everyone who is covered. [Yes, I know – some of you have never received a policy, ever!] Over the next few weeks you should be receiving a full policy with your name at the top. Everyone should receive his or her copy by April 5th. If you don't have a copy on that day, check first at your work location to see if it is there. Secondly, if not there, please let me know so I can send one to you. You will want to put this policy with your other important family documents.

In the realm of network usage most problems have stemmed from non-work related Internet usage. Our main problem here is that we have a limited amount of room on our connection to the Internet. So, if one person is checking mail or shopping on-line that activity takes space away from our staff that uses web-based programs for their jobs. Unfortunately it's hardly ever just one person but several and this only multiplies the problem. However, to help this situation improve we have new software in place that tracks Internet usage by user.

In closing, I would like to urge everyone to take a glance at the computer usage policy they signed at the beginning of their employment and evaluate their usage according to its guidelines. Finally, I am sure that with the help of new monitoring software and your cooperation. We can make our network more responsive and useful for everyone.
