sorry to hear that Uncle Horace and Aunt Mary
were sick so much can little Sarah laugh over it. Uncle Horace also
can tell a great many Baby stories March 5 I am
reading the Bible by course New testament through and the old
through. It is a pleasant day we are chopping the wood
Uncle father & mother and Uncle Lauren are drawing logs to
the Mill Sapman all night has Uncle Horace got any sap
trees near his house has this been much down in Oregon this
year the snow has most gone off here.

March 6 the day is pleasanter than yesleg day this
fore noon we are chopping wood Alfred loves to shoot
with his bow he can make his arrow go up higher than the
house Horad likes to run away one day I went down to
the corner after him son Daniel came running after me and

said that he was found i came home and learned that Mother had found him under the bed up stairs

March 7 yesterday we went to see Miss it closed up and has been ever since Emma has gone to Virginia teaching. She has two ~~old~~ \$2 or ~~one~~ month for each scholar March 11 Oliver came in before I had finished my sentence that night it snowed and has snowed 2 or 3 times since the snow has most gone off now we went to meeting last Sabbath and to town meeting yesterday the snow was most gone off and it was pretty hard work coming home I say and add on Mr. Isaac Watts name and as I wanted one on my name and Mother made one I wanted to put it here and the others told me that I might

March 16 this week Father is cutting up ^a foot wood which we drew from the hill. The weather has been very changeable. Last Sabbath morning it was quite warm but before noon it became very chily

and in the night and some Monday and yesterday the wind blew
and the snow flew merrily. Much a & snowy March winds not very
cold North Hampton folks have built a school house out where we
used to call West Hampton road and Mr. & Mrs. Lyman's children go
there & Father bought Molasses hog-shead but the Molasses was cleaned
out out we paid for 39 Galons at 40cts a Gallon there was \$17.00
of fast acet Molasses of sugar. March 2^d to day we weighed
little Eunice and she weighed 18 lbs and the last time they weighed
at baptism he weighed 20 lbs how much does little Sarah weigh we
all shan't like to see little Sarah some say that little Eunice
looks like aunt Sarah. Grandfathers folks are selling a horse \$300 3 years
old Wolnuts and chestnuts were plenty here last Fall does Uncle Horace
have any I suppose Uncle Horace has not heard our new
minister some say he appears like Mr. Swift of Northampton
"Ode to the Sun" has come out right now I must now
close as my paper is most full from your affectionate

Dear Uncle C. Abbott

I have not learned to write except on a
slate, but wish to wish to write a little to write. Now
I can I have learned to write with a pen. Since last Aug-
ust we have had 4 little cousins and one little sister. And since
March 1st 3 little grandsons. March 4 I have you a Sabbath School
Portland I see by our little paper there are 365 Well-drangs
sent to Oregon; does Uncle Horace see any of them? We have a new
library of 400 vol. Uncle Garrison is the the Draper interest
March 5 I have read the testament thorough and am reading the
old and have got so far as Ps 139 I have been down to Lanes
Peniss to get measured for a pair of leather shoes; I have a

Edwin he said he wished he was in Oregon and believed he should
be in 2 years if he could get so much aday. March 6 I have learned
to bldrd to make nine chains to day; Uncle Leavenworth learned Payson he
learned me and now I have learned calverd and perhaps he will
learn Horace March 7 Horace can answer many little Bible
questions. Oliver came in before I had finished my sentence
March 18 when asked who was cast into the lions den he says Payson or
Daniel just as it happens. We have got some little lambs one
of them died last week March 20 Harris ^{black} died last Aug, and was
buried the same day that Uncle Loring was. We made very pretty flow-
ers the last year that he lived, we bought a novelty branch and gave 25 cent
to for it. If Uncle Horace has seen any of the well knowns he has seen
some things about it. March 21 Father & I went down visiting yester-
day; I went into Doctor Clark's and had a tooth pulled out and saw
a great variety of birds and insects with nests and Eggs and other
curiosities that Mr William Clark had collected. July 4 our Teacher
is a Miss Lucia Wright of Syracuse of New York. Uncle Addison is com-
ing down here in 2 or 3 weeks. Father killed 3 little g. skunks today dug
them out.
