DIRECTOR'S CORNER



For the past six months I have been going through a national process to receive my certification as a Certified Community Action Professional

(CAAP). I have enjoyed re-reading about the history of the War on Poverty & the beginnings of the Community Action movement. It was President Lyndon Baines Johnson that declared a War on Poverty in his 1964 State of the Union address. This was less than two months after President Kennedy was shot. In this beech President Johnson proclaimed: "This Administration today here and now declares unconditional war on poverty, and I urge this Congress and all Americans to join with me in that effort. It will not be a short or easy struggle--no single weapon or strategy will suffice--but we shall not rest until that war is won. The richest nation on earth can afford to win it. We cannot afford to lose it." This was the first time in the history of America that a President had committed the nation to the daunting task of eliminating poverty.

Two months later President Johnson stated that "The War on Poverty is not a struggle simply to support people, to make them dependent on the generosity of others. It is a struggle to give people a chance. It is an effort to allow them to develop and use their capacities, as we have been allowed to develop & use ours, so that they can share as others share in the promise of the nation."

Our roots, as a Community Action, are deep & our history is rich and colorful. *Continued page 2*

CHILD DEVELOPMENT

The selection of children in Pre-K Head Start program began on July 18th. The enrollment capacity in 26 Part-day classrooms is 462 & we have about 800 children on our wait list. We will not be at Mooberry Elementary school this year but we have two classrooms at Peter Boscow Elementary school in Hillsboro School District.

This year Head Start will be serving 628 children in all program models.

SAFETY



Recently it came to the attention of the Head Start Policy Council that our "smoking lounge" behind the kitchen allowed smoke to drift onto the toddler playground—which is a violation of Head Start and Child Care regulations. This message was conveyed to staff who use the smoking area and they made recommendations which were shared with the Policy Council.


At the July meeting, the Policy Council approved a policy declaring the Child Development center and the area within 50 feet of the center "smoke-free". They asked Community Action to figure out a different place for smoking.

Human Resources and Head Start staff have started looking for possible areas to designate for smoking that will meet the requirements.

Meanwhile, smokers are asked not to smoke behind the Child Development Center and to find smoking areas that are at least 50 feet from the Child Development Center. If you have input, feel free to email Winnie Althizer or Marilyn Harrison.
