#### **ENERGY ASSISTANCE NEWS**

OLGA, (Oregon Low income Gas Assistance) is a new program that has started up to assist people with their Northwest Natural bills. Guidelines are the same as other energy assistance programs (LIEAP, OEA, etc.) and funds are currently available for those who need help with their gas bill. Refer applicants to us in Hillsboro or King City.

In October we will begin sending out our LIEAP mail out applications for seniors and people with disabilities who are on fixed incomes. This allows them to be served early in the heating season, since they are a federal priority. New staff will be coming on board during October so we will be gearing up for our busiest months ahead. We'll keep you posted regarding any additional funding news or upcoming training sessions for staff taking applications. We expect our large group training to take place November 12.

Ergonomics - Tips

Back to school, back to work – for some of us, just a good reminder taken from Prevention Magazine, December 2002. Try a New Position, Reduce muscle tension and curb computer related pain – by Doug Dollemore

Computers are a real pain in the neck...and shoulders... and back... now, new research from Emory University confirms what desk jockeys have felt all along; Upper body pain an stiffness are much more prevalent among computer users ... but their solution may surprise you.

- ✓ Position your keyboard lower than your elbows. (Try raising the height of your chair and folding the legs on your keyboard.)
- ✓ Push the keyboard farther back on your desk, so that your forearms and palms are supported by the desk when you type. Or, rest your palms and forearms on a keyboard wrist rest and the arm rests of your chair.
- ✓ Tilt your head slightly downward to view your monitor.
- ✓ Stay aligned. Keep your keyboard directly in front of your monitor. If you have to look sideways to view it, you increase the risk of upper body pain.

Research Frederick Gerr, MD was surprised to find "that people who didn't use conventional good computer posture actually experienced less pain."
