Pacific is the only college or university in Oregon requiring the Reading Endorsement for its elementary education students and the only institution in the nation with a Master of Education Visual Function in Learning degree program, which connects the Education Division and the College of Optometry. Professor Anita McClain of Education works with both programs and is widely published on the subject of reading.

FOR THE CLASSROOM

The following topics have been specifically planned for schools, although they could be fitted for other audiences, too:

Acting for the Camera.

Techniques for film and TV acting with discussion of working conditions and auditioning. Prepared scenes (1-2 minutes of modern realism) by two or three pairs of actors. Equipment required: Video camera, recorder, microphone on stand or cable, a large screen monitor, tape and a technician. Students should provide their own tape if they wish to keep the results.

Voiceovers - The Actor's Bread and Butter

Techniques for student actors seeking work in commercials, industrial voiceovers, etc. Scripts and handouts will be provided, and students will be advised as to audition tapes and training. Equipment required: good cassette recorder with microphone on stand, and speakers for playback (equipment should be of as good quality as possible.) Students should supply their own tape if they wish to keep the results.

Auditioning for Theatre, Film and Television

The differences in style. 4-5 students should prepare standard auditions - two contrasting monologues (modern realism in own age range and a classical piece - preferably in verse) plus a specialty (singing, dancing, a joke). These will be critiqued. Cold readings will be given and students coached on preparing for different styles of auditioning. A video camera, recorder and monitor helpful for evaluation. Professor Edwin Collier of Theatre not only directs drama but acts as well, and in the world of television and radio commercials he is the "Voice of G.I. Joe's." His visit to your stage or classroom will involve much student participation.
