TERMS OF ADMISSION.

Tuition to be paid to the Principal punctually before or at the close of each term. No deduction made for absence, except in case of sickness. Board can be had in private families for \$1,25 to \$1,50 per week. Pupils who prefer furnishing their own board, can obtain rooms for the purpose at moderate rents.

The abilities for enlarging the operations of this Institution (as is well known to the public) are such that the Board of Trustees are determined to render every facility for the improvement and convenience of the students which their ample resources will warrant. Situated as it is in one of the most heathful and pleasant villages of our State, readily accessible to all the public conveyances, yet free from the moral contaminations which may attach to either, they confidently anticipate that its growth, ere long, will be commensurate with its acknowledged abilities and advantages.

This Academy has been selected by the Regents of the University to instruct Common School Teachers, according to an act of

the Legislature passed March 30, 1849, appropriating \$250, in each County, for that purpose.

On account of this appropriation, the Trustees offer Free Tuition for four months, in each of the years 1850 and 1851, to sixty

INTERNAL REGULATIONS.

The exercises each day will be opened and closed with prayer, to which singing may be added, at the

All students, except those boarding with their parents or guardians, are strictly required to attend public worship on the Sabbath, at such churches in the village as shall be designated by their parents or guardians, or in case no such designation shall be made, at such church as they shall prefer, and abstain from the usual and ordinary occupations of the week.

The indulgence of profane or vulgar language, playing at cards, or any other game of chance, rude or indecent behavior, insult or abuse to others, making clamorous or improper noises, to the disturbance of other students, or the inhabitants of the place, and all other conduct inconsistent with decorum, are strictly forbidden.
