RE:

HOW & WHERE I DID THE STUDY OF THE COMMUNITY INPUT QUESTIONNAIRE

Attached you will find a copy of the Community Input Questionnaire, copy of Community Forum Report-February 24, 1983 at the Cornelius Community Center and five pages of the results of the tabulations of the 437 responses received.

I did five different tabulations:

1. I took the three most important areas of need by <u>individual programs</u>, <u>senior centers</u>, and <u>participating agencies</u> that people indicated in order of priority as being 1. most important; 2. second most important; 3. third most important (see page One-second section of questionnaire).

I wrote down the need areas people prioritized as 1, 2, 3, I added a mark for each response on the same area, added number of responses and took the largest number of responses as the most important. To arrived at the % figure I took the largest number of responses divided it between total responses received by each program/center/agency (i.e. $19 frac{2}{5} frac{37=51\%}{3}$), (see questionnaire findings chart-April, 1983).

- 2. I took the three most important areas of need by <u>total programs/senior</u> <u>centers/agencies</u> as indicated above. I did the same process to arrive at the average % by total of all programs.
- 3. I did another survey as you requested, <u>excluding the Fuel Assistance</u>

 <u>Program</u> that had 208 responses, arriving at the same results, with a higher % average.

The three most important areas of need were:

Employment 47%
 Housing 29%
 Energy 27%

4. For the breakdown of the three most important areas of need:
1. Employment, 2. Housing and 3. Energy. I listed the specific services/
programs listed on questionnaire (see page 1, 2 & 3) added number of responses under each service taking the largest number of responses as # 1 and in consecutive order to the least important one. (see breakdown of the three most important areas of need by total responses).

- 5. Using the same system I also did breakdown of less important areas of need (i.e. Health, Education, Food & Nutrition, Legal Services and Transportation)(see results attached of breakdown of less important areas of need).
- 6. Listed other suggested areas WCCAO could be providing services that were listed under "other" by different individuals, no tabulation indicated because they were all different.

The Study was conducted for the most part here at the office between typing jobs (at my desk and front desk) with the exception of $1\frac{1}{2}$ hrs. on a Sunday that I worked at home to organize the form and to tabulate the per centages.

Community Forums questionnaires were filled out at the two community meetings. Participating agencies sent back the questionnaires by mail or delivered them in person. Senior Centers sent questionnaires back with the R.S.V.P. bus driver. WCCAO's programs delivered them to main office. The majority of the questionnaires 208 of the 437 responses received were administered here in the office to Fuel Assistance Clients.

COMMUNITY FORUMS REPORT

In our Community Forum-February 24th, at the Cornelius Community Center we had about 42 persons present, including 5 staff and 10 children. Out of the 42 people we had 12 hispanic individuals from the Hillsboro, Cornelius and Forest Grove areas. At the entrance we handed out pamphlets with WCCAO's program descriptions.

Mr. Cole gave an introduction to the public and explained how the WCCAO Board is formed and invited the public to fill out applications for the WCCAO Board. Rocky gave a slide presentation about the existing WCCAO's programs. We opened the session to comments from the audience and it was explained the Board will consider their comments in planning budgets and programs for FY '84. In summary some of the comments that were made by some persons were:

1. The need of additional housing assistance (3 people)

2. Need to support Wood-Coop and Gleaners, encouraging them to join together and pull resources.

3. Need to support Emergency Hotline.

4. New industry in Wash. Co. should be required to sign First-Source hiring agreements.

5. Need to expand bed capacity of Emergency Shelter House.

6. Need for Self-help Food Canning

7. Need for drop-in Resource Center for the unemployed.

8. WCCAO needs to improve public awareness about its programs.

For the upcoming March 10 meeting, at Beaverton City Hall, 4950 S. W. Hall, 7:00-9:00 p.m. I sent press releases to the Oregonian, Metro West Bureau, Willamette Week, Wilsonville Times, Valley Times, Tigard Times, Downtowner, This Week and the Aloha Breeze and to 45 churches of the Aloha, Beaverton and Tigard areas.
